Students are invited from all over the country and Puerto Rico to come to Washington, DC to meet with members of Congress and discuss the importance of their particular research, the impact UR has had on their college experience and future educational and career goals, and advocate for the funding of important federal programs that support their work. This is CUR's 25th annual rendition of the event and the organization's second time hosting in a virtual capacity.
