# Describe your leadership experience both within CUR and extramural.

I'm in my fourth term as a CUR representative (Arts & Humanities Division). The two most important things I've done as a councilor are serving as chair of Nominations and editing the Arts and Humanities CUR website (curartsandhumanities.org). At my own institution (Albion College), I have served as Director of the undergraduate research program, I've mentored many students in long summer projects, and I've explored ways of integrating research into lower division classes. I have also participated in CUR workshops, and I am the coorganizer for a regional undergraduate conference in Medieval and Renaissance Studies. My most recent project involving undergraduate research is UnfortunateCreatures.org, a website featuring pre-modern narratives of natural disaster, relying in part on undergraduate research.

## How will your skills help the Council successfully uphold its charge?

I can best support the charge to the Council by using my fairly long experience as a CUR divisional representative to help articulate the concerns of divisions and to bridge the insight of the Division to the work of CUR as a whole. I strongly believe that CUR can best achieve its strategic plan and raise its profile by leveraging its existing publications and showcasing the work of its members. As CURAH website editor, for example, I have tried to move the site beyond brief news and notes of upcoming events and publications. We have been adding best-practice guides, tip-sheets (for both faculty and undergraduates), and examples of cutting-edge projects in both the Arts and the Humanities. Our website also represents an important avenue for promoting diversity and inclusion in the division.

# Describe your leadership experience both within CUR and extramural.
